- * offers diligent leadership that is mission focused and keeps looking forward



Bio for Rev. Traci Blackmon

Rev. Traci Blackmon is the Executive Minister of Justice & Local Church Ministries for The United Church of Christ and Senior Pastor of Christ The King United Church of Christ in Florissant, MO.

Initially ordained in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Rev. Blackmon served in various ministry capacities for 9 years, prior to becoming ordained in the United Church of Christ and installed as the first woman and 18th pastor in the 162 year history of Christ The King United Church of Christ. A registered nurse with more than 25 years of healthcare experience, Rev. Blackmon's clinical focus was cardiac care and in later years her focus shifted to mobile healthcare in underserved communities with the greatest health disparities in her region. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing from Birmingham - Southern College (1985), and a Master of Divinity degree from Eden Theological Seminary (2009).

As pastor, Rev. Blackmon leads Christ The King in an expanded understanding of church as a sacred launching pad of community engagement and change. This ethos has led to a tripling of both membership and worship attendance over the last seven years, expanding membership engagement opportunities, and the establishment of community outreach

programs. Community programming includes a computer lab, tutoring, continuing education classes, summer programming, a robotics team, children's library and girls' mentoring program, all housed in the church.

Regionally, Rev. Blackmon's signature initiatives have included *Healthy Mind, Body, and Spirit*, a mobile faith-based outreach program she designed to impact health outcomes in impoverished areas. *Sacred Conversations on Solomon's Porch*, quarterly clergy in-services designed to equip local clergy to assess physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual health concerns within congregational life, *Sista SOS Summit*, an intergenerational health symposium for women and girls, and *Souls to the Polls STL*, an ecumenical, multi-faith collaborative that was successful in providing over 2,800 additional rides to the polls during local and national elections.

A featured voice with many regional, national, and international media outlets and a frequent contributor to print publications, Rev. Blackmon's communal leadership and work in the aftermath of the killing of Michael Brown, Jr., in Ferguson, MO has gained her both national and international recognition and audiences from the White House to the Carter Center to the Vatican. She was appointed to the Ferguson Commission by Governor Jay Nixon and to the President's Advisory Council on Faith-Based Neighborhood Partnerships for the White House by President Barack H. Obama. Rev. Blackmon co-authored the White Privilege curriculum for the United Church of Christ and toured the nation with Rev. Dr. William Barber of Moral Mondays and Repairer of the Breech, Rev. Dr. James Forbes of The Drum Major Institute and pastor emeritus of The Riverside Church in New York, and Sister Simone Campbell of Nuns on the Bus proclaiming the need for a Moral Revival in this nation.

Rev. Blackmon is a graduate of Leadership St. Louis and currently serves on the boards of The Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, Chicago Theological Seminary, and WomanPreach! Rev. Blackmon is a co-author of the newly released White Privilege curriculum through the United Church of Christ and has received several awards and recognitions, inclusive of:

Rev. Blackmon currently resides in both St. Louis, MO and Cleveland, OH and was named 2017 Citizen of the Year by The St. Louis American and as one of St. Louis' 100 most influential voices as well as . Rev. Blackmon is the proud mother of three adult children: Kortni Devon; Harold II; and Tyler Wayne Blackmon.

PROTECT OUR EARTH WHEN MAKING MAJOR PURCHASES You Can Have Your Cake and Eat It Too

In the US, we're lucky to have access to a wide variety of major home appliances and cars. We're no longer restricted to buying from just Sears, Frigidaire, General Motors and Ford. But the wide varieties of products make our purchase decisions more difficult. We often imprudently decide by choosing a product whose name is favorable or one that we've had before, or one that's the least expensive.

Products such as stoves, refrigerators, washers, driers, furnaces and cars last us for years, so ongoing costs often are as important as the initial cost. And the model type, freezer on top vs side by side, or sedan vs SUV, may be as important as brand. Country of origin may be important to us as well.

But one major consideration often neglected is effect on the environment, both of the new item and its ongoing use. Which should we choose, a large capacity washer or a smaller one, a full-size car vs a compact, a rider vs a push mower – and the choices go on. The collective quantity and type of materials in the product do matter, and should be a consideration in our purchase. Perhaps more important are ongoing quantities of fuels needed to run the appliance; how much gasoline, natural gas, or electricity. Ongoing costs of fuels are available but obscure and not significant monthly, but become significant over the years.

Relative quantities of fuels needed for cars are known; so long term cost can be pretty well predicted. While miles per gallon (MPG) of gasoline are publicized, the amount of electricity needed to run a refrigerator isn't as obvious. If the difference in electricity needed by two competing refrigerators is multiplied by the months kept in service, the final cost (parallel to the influence on the environment) can be impressive and will get our attention.

To determine the ultimate cost of an appliance, the government designed and regularly updates information on ENERGY STAR, the nonbiased rating system that simplifies our purchase decisions. Appliances that carry the ENERGY STAR rating are superior in energy consumption to those that don't. The planet benefits by our wise decisions and so do we.

Financial Update

When We Give, We Reach Out With Helping Hands

When we give to the ministries of First Congregational UCC, we are serving those inside and outside our church community. As 1st Peter 4:10 says: "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, with whatever gift each of you has received."

Highlights:

- **Income** is down about \$11,200 versus budget entirely due to a significant shortfall in pledge income. This is, of course, a matter of some concern. Some of the shortfall is due to timing of pledge payments, and strong results in May are encouraging. We are monitoring this closely to determine if we should expect a shortfall for the full year.
- Expenses are about \$7,500 higher than budget. This is **not** a cause for alarm, as it is due entirely to timing of payments a large payment in April for employee benefits that covers the next several months of benefits. This budget overrun will work itself out over the next 4-5 months. Excluding this, expenses are being well-managed and are generally on or below budget.
- **Cash** to ensure comfortable cash balance in our bank account, in May the Trustees approved a draw of \$20,000 from the FCC Foundation's Ministers Fund. This draw was authorized by the congregation in January as a part of the approval of the 2018 budget.
